
## WALKING THE LENT PRAYER LABYRINTH: WEDNESDAY, MARCH 31 - MONDAY, APRIL 5

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## EARLY IN THE MORNING . . . A Quiet, Reflective, and Socially Distanced Outdoor Easter Service SUNDAY, APRIL 4, 8 a.m.




From **8 to 8:30 a.m.** Easter morning, join us under the large tree on the lawn for a reflective, peace-filled Easter service. Be sure to bring your lawn chair, face mask, and warm coat. No brass or strings. No triumphant organ music. No long sermon. But join us for a service we are calling “Early in the Morning,” which consists of readings, prayers, scripture, a message, and reflective music. On that very first Easter morning, those who went to the tomb of Jesus did not go in anticipation of a party. They were taking embalming fluids. Their response to the empty tomb wasn’t joy, as much as it was perplexity and shock. We don’t always cheer at the most wonderful news in life. Sometimes we pause and reflect. Sometimes we simply are grateful to be with others. On Easter join us early in the morning for “Early in the Morning.”

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## EASTER SUNDAY: A Celebration of the Resurrection SUNDAY, APRIL 4, 11 a.m. /Online through our website and Facebook

“Jesus Christ is Risen Today.” We join together online for communion and a special celebration that brings together joy-filled music from our choir, our friends from the Second Ending Brass Quintet, and soloists. During worship we will celebrate the resurrection in new ways as we reflect in particular on forgiveness and on John 20:19-23, probably the most overlooked incident on the first Easter Sunday. Why does Easter matter? Why does it matter this year? That is our focus.

*“He is risen. He is risen, indeed!”*



I was driving down I-64. In the adjacent lane, there was a truck carrying a large load of pipes. If one of those pipes were not adequately secured, and if it slid off the truck, that would be horrific. Did I have faith that those pipes were adequately secured? I asked myself that question, but I did not answer it, because I was too busy accelerating, so as to pass the truck.

In what do we place our faith?

Plenty of my students at the university consider themselves agnostics or atheists. Although I don't discount their perspectives or feelings, I think many of them really are seekers. They recognize that their understanding of faith from their childhood doesn't square up with what they believe now, and so they are seeking. Like me, when I was 19 years old, some of them say, "Reason matters. I'm not going to make a leap of faith. That is illogical."

It is great for those students—it is great for all of us—to reflect on faith and to ask the question—again—"In what do we place our faith?"



We may have faith that the water that comes out of our tap is drinkable (even if we lack that same faith when in a foreign country). We may have faith that our dog will love us, even on our very worst days. When we are young, we may have faith that our parents will watch over us, making sure that we are fed and have a roof over us. We may find faith in relationships. As J. Ellsworth Kalas says, "We bet our happiness, our emotional security, and sometimes our very lives on the faith we have in people." We may believe that the sun will come out tomorrow, because we have experienced much data that confirms that. We may believe—or we may have believed—that the economy is constantly getting stronger. We may have faith—or we may have had faith—that just as scientific discoveries increase over time, so our sense of morality increases over time. And then that faith may be shaken.

As humans, we are characterized by rationality and by emotions, but we also are characterized by faith. The decisions we make every day are grounded in acts of faith.

In worship during the weeks between Easter and Pentecost, we will focus on how we can find, nurture, develop, and live out our faith. Hebrews 11:1 states, "Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." What does that mean for us? What difference does it make if you are a Christian? Why do we have reason for hope? How can we become increasingly faithful, in ways that make a difference in our lives?

Isaiah 40:31 reminds us that "those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and now grow weary, they will walk and not be faint." John Claypool says that the order of that description may seem like it is written in reverse: Isaiah begins with soaring and ends with walking. All of us pass through different stages in our lives. Sometimes we soar, sometimes we run, and sometimes we simply walk forward in faith. How we nurture our faith in new ways is what we will experience in April and May.


# FAITH THROUGH OTHERS' EYES

In reflecting on the Psalms, Harold Kushner writes, "There are days when I have trouble (with faith), days when I wonder about the efficacy of prayer and whether good will indeed triumph in the end. On days like that, I need to turn to the Psalms, not to find answers, . . . not to be told what to believe, but to be reminded of what the world looks like when seen through the eyes of a believer."

During the weeks between Easter and Pentecost, we will look at faith through the eyes of believers like Cleopas, Job, Abraham, and James. Please join us on the journey.

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### OUTDOOR EVENING WORSHIP: "SEEING FAITH AS A JOURNEY"

Sunday, April 18, 5 p.m

In anticipation of good weather Sunday, April 18, and looking forward to our soon-to-be-built deck, bring your mask, your lawn chair, your warm clothes, and your joy to a special evening service. It will be different from the morning service and will focus on a unique description of Abraham in Genesis 15:1-6. This is a passage rarely discussed by Christians today, but which was so significant to the first Christians that it was quoted not just in Paul's letters to the Galatians and the Romans, but also in the letter from James. Join us for a unique time of worship and fellowship.

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### THE ROBERTSON DECK

At its March meeting, the Session voted to approve the construction of a 36-foot-long deck to host outdoor services and events. The deck will be built within the next two months, after necessary permits are secured. It will be close to the ground, adjacent to the side of the building that houses the nursery, in the same area where we've met for outdoor worship. The deck enhances our ability to conduct outdoor events, especially when the weather is nice. It will be large enough for speakers, microphones, and musical equipment. When not used for worship, it can be used for outside meetings, studies, or fellowship opportunities. Again, it will be low enough to the ground that it requires no railing, so it will be less visible.

The funding for this project comes from an anonymous donation and from the Robertson Endowment. The Session expressed deep gratitude for the generous anonymous donation. With approval of that donor, the Session voted to name the new deck "The Robertson Deck," in recognition of the Robertson family's endowment having funded more than \$80,000 in enhancements to worship, fellowship, and congregational care over more than 15 years. We express our deep thanks to Fred, Pat, and their family for all of the ways their generosity has influenced and shaped the ways we are able to do ministry at Second.

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## A CHANGE IN TONE

Late author Dallas Willard penned a volume entitled "Hearing God," addressing the importance of developing a conversational relationship with God. I love this title because it is so directly descriptive of my experiences in music throughout my life. General discourse rarely frames music in this way, but I have consistently found that all of my musical experiences have shared this truth: that each encounter is a chance to *hear God*. Whether through a symphony orchestra, a beginning pianist, the banjo-and-fiddle-playing of my grandfather when I was a child, the efforts of an auditioning chorister, or the earnest singing of neighbors experiencing homelessness, God's voice has been present in every musical encounter I can recall.

This is a beautiful metaphor for so many of our encounters with God. We can engage with the content or "stuff" of an experience (the words of scripture, the meaning of a sermon, the technical aspects of a song) while at the same time encountering *tone*. When we hear the words of scripture, we can engage not only with its literal meaning but also the tonal beauty of God's love and grace. I like to think this is why God can speak so fully to us through music and art, breaking through our inclination toward analysis and cognitive understanding with the unmistakable beauty and fullness of God's *tone*.

I am reminded that "hearing God" in darker, sadder and heavier music is like witnessing the care of a parent or loved one who shares our griefs and difficulties. The goodness of God's care is often spoken in songs of empathy and compassion, reflections of God's willingness to walk beside us through our trials. It is also powerful to exult in the triumphant music of God's glory and wonder and might—and much like Easter following Lent, exultation that finds its meaning because of the somber experiences that came before.

As we come to the end of Lent and move toward recovery from the hardships of COVID-19, we begin to hear a change in tone. Life seems a bit more optimistic and spirited, and less mournful and despairing. The music is brighter. The sense of hope is increasing.

As we share together a welcome change in tone this spring, may we find ourselves "hearing God" in unexpected ways.

## FROM SECOND TO THIRD PRESBYTERIAN (AND BACK)



Many of you know the variety of connections that our congregation shares with Third Presbyterian. Both churches were founded as outreach churches from First Presbyterian. Both churches have smaller, more intimate congregations. And we also have personal connections with Third Presbyterian. Linda Norman's father served as pastor there in the 1950s, and Debbie Platte—she and Ray, her husband, who join us frequently for worship—is the church secretary there.

In addition, since the beginning of 2021, our connections with Third have increased, as we have been supportive of the ministry of our friend, the Rev. Dr. Larry Toney, who now is serving at Third as pastor. During the last three months, our pastoral staff has preached and led worship there, with Catherine preaching there once, and Nancy Rowland and Craig preaching twice each. Members of Third came to our Shrove Tuesday drive-by pancake dinner, others from Third have supported some of our feeding and hunger ministries, and yet others have joined us for our Wednesday evening Lenten gatherings.

We are grateful for this friendship, and we particularly want to draw attention to an opportunity to be part of a stress support group with Larry Toney and in coordination with the members of Third Presbyterian (see the "We're Stressed" article in this newsletter).

### "WE'RE STRESSED"—Stress Support Group

*How do you manage stress? How has the pandemic affected you?*

If stress is an issue for you, join our friend, the Rev. Dr. Larry Toney, and Third Presbyterian Church, in a four-week Virtual Stress Support Group. The group will meet via Zoom on four successive Wednesdays—**April 14 to May 5—**from noon to 1 p.m. The group's name is "Success Over Stress," or SOS, and it will be psychoeducational. By psychoeducational, Larry means that he'll share some things about stress, but mostly he'll invite you to talk about the stresses in your life.

- Studies have shown when we share with others, we find hope. We also learn we are not alone.
- Processing things in a group setting can be healing. It gives us the opportunity to get the things rattling inside us outside of ourselves, so that we can see them.
- Sharing in a group enables us to learn from others and find encouragement from others.
- Participating in a group allows a person to normalize stress. Feeling stress is normal. We all struggle with stress, and it's healthy to share with others ways to manage it.



The group will have these simple ground rules:

- Larry will serve as the group facilitator. As many of you know, Larry has dual degrees in Mental Health Counseling and Pastoral Counseling and is a National Certified Counselor.
- Things shared in the group need to remain in the group, so that there can be a measure of confidentiality.
- When you join the group, you can remain anonymous if you prefer. You don't have to reveal who you are.
- A person may join the four-week-long group any Wednesday between **April 14 and May 5**.
- The group is free.
- The group is for Christians and non-Christians. All are welcome.
- Registration is optional but helps Larry plan.


## SECOND PRESBYTERIAN BOOK CLUB!
