From the Senior Pastor

Thinking about Birds and God's Love

About two months ago I happened to run into Spencer Tinkham. My first response was not initially seeing him as a son of the church, or even as Jeff and Denise Tinkham's son or Clay's brother. It wasn't even to think about him as an expert duckdecoy carver.

My first response—apparently because I find myself encountering his art in different places, particularly on Facebook—was to stutter and stammer. That is what I did. His artwork, his sculptures are so beautiful. Just on a different level.

If you'd like to see his work but haven't yet made your way to the Virginia Museum of Contemporary Art in Virginia Beach, I encourage you to carve out time Sunday, March 10, after worship, to see his exhibition called "Witness." Admission is free, and although we at SPC are not going as a group per se, some of us will leave the church around 12:30, hoping to arrive there around 1. We invite you to join us to see his work and other exhibitions there as well.

Spencer's sculptures and carvings are shown in museums and universities across the country, but this is the first major showing locally. As the exhibit description says, "Birds were and are tiny witnesses to the big things happening on our planet. Tinkham pieces together their stories and shares their minute beauty with us, carving the details of their feathers into enlarged spotlights."

As I took in his work, I thought about how indeed "birds are tiny witnesses to the big things happening on our planet." The Bible often uses birds to convey profound spiritual lessons. In the story of Noah and the ark, Genesis 8:6-12 notes that after the floodwaters recede, Noah sent out a dove to search for dry land. The dove returned with an olive leaf in its beak, signaling the end of the flood and God's faithfulness.

Similarly, in Matthew 6:26, Jesus says, "Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they?" Again, Jesus reminds us of God's care and provision for us.

But as we approach Holy Week and Good Friday, I'm struck by how the Bible uses images of birds in reflecting on God's desire to protect us. Psalm 91:4 says, "He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness will be your shield and rampart."

And in Matthew 23:37, shortly before his death, Jesus laments, "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, and you were not willing."

So frequently we turn from God's care. So frequently God laments.

Whatever else Easter may mean to you, I hope you recognize it as a time when God—for our sake—covered us, trying to save us, even as a hen gathers her chicks. The reality, however, is that that gift—God's saving us—is something we turn from and frequently don't even acknowledge.

My prayer this Easter is that you recognize how much God loves and cares for you, so you may experience not just hope, but everlasting life.








Desire Detox: Transforming Temptation

Take an hour out of your week, bring a bag lunch, and join us for a meal, conversation, and Bible study,



From the Director of Music

Why Singing Together Defies Brokenness

"Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though He was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself, by taking the form of a servant..." —Philippians 2:5-7

During this season of Lent, our Sunday worship services are focusing on the theme of "Disordered Desires"— the seven deadly sins. It doesn't take long each day to take note of the ways the world leans into these paths to division:

- The greed of blatantly dishonest financial dealings from the rich and powerful;
- The envy that leads to unhealthy competition and crushes the possibility of cooperation;
- The gluttony of nations and individuals for power, for wealth, for influence;
- The sloth of treating memes as reliable news, causing us to misunderstand our world;
- The lust for our immediate wants, resulting in addictions and distorted acts of destruction;
- The anger that fills our news feeds with shooting after shooting;
- And the pride that prevents us from looking at one another in gratitude and love.

While I love the music itself and the relationships with the singers I know, the central reason I am still energized and motivated and devoted to this work after almost 40 years is that I believe, more than ever, that this work matters in our world. Each week I witness too many examples of division that affects us all and separates us not only from one another, but from God. And each of those weeks, when so many are aching for evidence that there is hope in the face of these discouraging events, I also witness this:

Singers who are generous in their learning and willingness to be challenged.

- ... who are happy to add their individual gifts, and to celebrate the gifts of others.
- ... who want to offer freely to those around them without expectation of return.

... who work for hours and hours simply to offer their best gift.

... who exert their spirits and skills for the benefit of others, and in doing so unleash joy and care for one another.

These are models of behavior representing the <u>opposite</u> of the deadly sins.

These behaviors happen, without fail, among individuals who we might identify as contradictory: men and women, young and old, conservative and liberal, wealthy and poor, trained and amateur. When we sing together, we occupy a space that does not have room for greed, envy, sloth, and the rest.

Whether singing together or listening to others do so, it is good to be reminded that the overwhelming bad news of our world is not the definitive model of how life can be. I believe that God does speak to us through music and that this model of restored relationships is evidence. May we find our encouragement to be increased as we sing together, receiving God's powerful example of brokenness restored.

Missions and Outreach: Sharing the Good News of God's Love

At Second Presbyterian, we are "mission-minded." What does that mean? What is the role of the Missions and Outreach committee, and why do we do it?

In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus' final words to his disciples, after his resurrection and just before his Ascension, were: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20). In Romans, Paul writes: "How then will they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching? And how are they to preach unless they are sent? As it is written, 'How beautiful are the feet of those who preach the good news!" (Romans 10:14–15).

Missions and Outreach is about sharing the Good News of God's great love for us and the restoring, life- and soul-changing power of Jesus' atoning death on the cross and his resurrection. We do this by sending out and supporting missionaries to the ends of the earth. And we do it by sharing God's love with our community and those that live around us. This sharing of love is done through intentional acts of mercy and grace in order to relieve suffering and to point non-believers to Christ.

Through your generosity of time and money, Second has played an important role in caring for and feeding members of our community and neighbors who have real needs. Partners in our feeding ministry have noticed increased demand for assistance as emergency government funding for COVID-related needs has been used up while food inflation has continued to rise. Thank you for your faithfulness.

Also, at the Session meeting in February, the church approved a disbursement from the Jean Morton Memorial Fund to help the Kerr family purchase a vehicle for use in their ministry in the Middle East.
